Interim's Letter

Miracles were the subject of my sermon on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 8), and my thoughts keep returning to miracles as I prepare to say "goodbye" to Calvary. It was a whole series of miracles that brought me here, and I invite the rest of you to think about the miracles in your own lives that have led you, too, to this place of grace and community.

In my sermon I stressed that miracles happen when two freedoms meet: the freedom of a human person and the freedom of God, who always wills good for us but needs our cooperation to make it happen, not just for ourselves but for others. I think of a time when I was in deep trouble: fired from my job, facing the end of a career and essentially

of my working life when I was only in my mid-fifties, with a son still in college. Then by chance—so it seemed—my path crossed that of some people I had known and worked with, generous people who wanted to help me, and did, by creating a job for me. They took it on trust that I could do good work for them in a field I really had no experience in. They helped me and rescued me from some bad decisions and later supported me on my path to priesthood, which eventually took me away from them.

"He drew me up from the desolate pit, out of the miry bog, and set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure." That is how the author of Psalm 40 describes the miracle God did in his or her life, and that is how I feel about so many points in my own life when God's free choice to rescue me or to steer my steps encountered the free choice of other people to help me: when miracles happened. I invite all of you, as you approach a new season of ministry, to reflect on the miracles in your own lives. Use that reflection as a base from which to encounter the new season at Calvary; let it open your hearts to reveal the moments, in the years to come, when your freedom can encounter God's freedom to build up Calvary and make it a light to the world.

Vestry Minutes

October 16 Vestry Minutes:

- Financially we are keeping our heads above water. Gifts are helping.
- Soup Supper donations should be kept locally. We will not donate Oct. proceeds to Bricks for Haiti.
- We still have \$100 in Christian Outreach Funds that has not been used this year. A motion was made to use this money for Haiti and have a special collection on Oct. 31, which will be taken to convention on behalf of Calvary. Motion passed.
- The Koiers went to the United Church supper, a multi course dinner. A \$500 donation from the Food Shelf funds these

dinner along with donations from Hannaford. Would Hannaford give us produce to use for our soup?

- Stewardship Sunday will be Nov. 13 with a Table Eucharist downstairs.
- The Bishop has 2 candidates for us so far.
- Environmental Products & Services will remove the old oil tank Oct. 19. Grant money from the Diocese will cover part of the cost.
- A \$1,000 donation was received from Ken Wiggin's sister, designated for Ken's Kitchen. A motion was made to renovate the existing kitchen and put up a memorial plaque calling it Ken's Kitchen.
- The Sausage Booth still needs to be put away and Rummage Sale items still need to be removed. A motion was made to give the United Church the \$50.00 remaining in our Outreach Funds with a thank you note for hosting Harvest Market again this year.
- Chuck will have our new Mission Statement printed and framed for the narthex.
- Karen is giving up monitoring our pager. John Koier will take it over for a week.
- The back door needs repairs. It does not close fully and needs a sweep on the bottom. The side door frame is rotten from rain splashing off the cement step. Chuck & John will investigate.
- UTO boxes will be collected on Stewardship Sunday.
- A thank you letter was received from the Diocese for our timely Audit Report.

October 24 Vestry/MDC Minutes:

- The search is now closed. Three candidates are interested in our position.
- The interview is a two-way process. We interview each other.
- Vestry members will be part of this interview with the MDC, excluding Karen and Pam.
- Candidates should meet Karen at some point.

- Hospitality – lunch and a tour, service upstairs, interview and dinner.
- Actual interview should take one hour tops.
- A thank you letter for coming should be sent the day following the interview, telling them to call with any questions.
- References should be contacted by MDC members.
- If something was said or hinted about dissention – follow up with the Senior Warden at their last church. Ask candidate if people in current congregation know they are looking for a position.
- References can be called at any time.
- Role playing took place for the church tour and face to face interview.

November 13 Vestry Minutes:

- Linda reported that a new financial assessment system was announced at convention. She will bring in the information and explain it to the parish at the Annual Meeting.
- The bill has been paid for the oil tank removal. The tank was 1,000 gals. Ten 55 gallon drums of good oil were taken out.
- AA will begin using the undercroft Tuesday evenings. Their donations will go into item 1746 Heating oil/gas to offset their use of heat and lights.
- At convention Fran presented almost \$400 from Calvary for the Bricks for Haiti project.
- New Safer Church Policy information will be forthcoming. All members required to have the training must have a certificate less than 5 years old.
- November soup supper proceeds will go to the Food Shelf. December will go to Vt. Irene.
- John will add our soup supper info to the online Front Porch Forum.
- The MDC met with Ann. Three people are interested in Calvary.
- Our chimney has been cleaned as required by the gas company. A screened cap is

needed on the chimney to keep squirrels out. The sweep will call us about putting one on.

- The burner ordered by Vermont Gas is too small. Jeff Fortune will research what is needed and will call us.
- Karen will call Brookhaven to find out what their needs are this year.
- John will send out a message to all about caroling at Green Mtn. Nursing Home. If people are interested, we will go.
- So far \$1,150 has been donated to Ken's Kitchen renovation. Jack will bring us plans for changes to our kitchen. We can fundraise in January.
- John has repaired the side door. Weather stripping is still needed.
- The office has a strong wet paint smell since last Fall. Closing off the room makes it worse.
- We should do an air test. Karen will contact Bob Wertz from the Diocesan Earth Stewards Committee on environmental stewardship to see if he has any ideas.
- John is still monitoring the pager. Maybe we should have a signup sheet for monthly monitoring.
- The Ecumenical Ministry will meet here on Dec. 1. Fran and Dave will be present.
